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Commentary On Romans 12 1

12:1,2 The apostle having closed the part of his epistle wherein he argues and proves various doctrines which are practically applied, here urges important duties from gospel principles. He entreated the Romans, as his brethren in Christ, by the mercies of God, to present their bodies as a living sacrifice to Him.

Romans 12:1 Commentaries: Therefore I urge you, brethren ...

Romans 12:1. I beseech you. A lesson to ministers. Ministers of the gospel should be gentle, tender, and affectionate. They should be kind in feeling, and courteous in manner--like a father or mother. Nothing is ever gained by a sour, harsh, crabbed, dissatisfied manner. Sinners are never scolded either into duty or into heaven.

Romans 12:1 - Therefore I urge... - Verse-by-Verse Commentary

Romans 12:1. I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, &c.] The apostle having finished the doctrinal part of this epistle, proceeds to that which is more practical; and enforces the several duties of religion, upon the principles he had before laid down, a method generally observed by him in all his epistles.

This is "the true sacrificial worship to which the cult of the Jerusalem Temple had all along pointed. Romans 12:1 does with temple worship, in other words, what 2:25-29 did with circumcision" (Wright, 704). This living self-sacrifice, Paul declares, is "holy, acceptable (euaeston well-pleasing) to God" (v. 1).

7. In the original language, Paul simply writes 'the *fathers'. He means Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Jacob's 12 sons were the *ancestors of the 12 tribes. (That is, the 12 large families which became the *Israelites.) 8. *Christ was born as a *Jew (Matthew 1:1). The last words of verse 5 are words to praise God.
